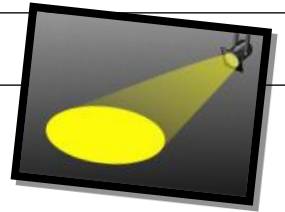

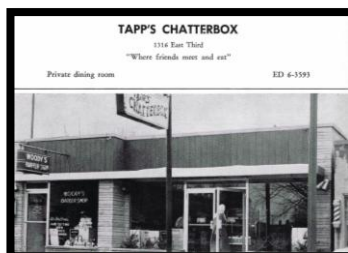


### The Spotlight Shines on Janet Lea Tapp



Janet was born in the wee hours of an October morning to Louise and John Tapp at Methodist Hospital in Indianapolis. Sister Joanie was 2 ½ years old at the time and welcomed her little sister with open arms.

Janet's maternal grandfather was a pharmacist and owned drug stores in both Indianapolis and Louisville. While Louise was working at the soda fountain in her father's drug store in Indianapolis, she met John Tapp, who was born in Bloomington and moved to Indianapolis when he was 19 years old. He was a salesman for Best Foods (he sold Hellman's Mayonnaise, Shinola Shoe Polish, etc.) and traveled the southern part of the state during the week. **Tapp's Chatterbox** (at that time known as Whitey's) was one of his contacts. It was at one of his stops that he learned the restaurant was for sale, and the rest is history. Janet was 7 years old when the family moved from Indianapolis to Bloomington – she began 2<sup>nd</sup> grade at University Elementary School during the second semester.





The restaurant was definitely a “family” business – Janet’s first job after school each day was to peel 3 lard cans of potatoes to slice for French fries (no pre-sliced, blanched, packaged fries back in those days). The restaurant afforded her the opportunity to interact with a wide variety of individuals, from IU students to the most talented and respected university professors.



It was at **Tapp’s Chatterbox** where Janet met a lovely couple who ate dinner at the restaurant every night (Bill and Adrienne). Bill was the Housing Manager for Wright Quad, and he asked Janet one evening if she would come to work for him at the Center Desk. This was during Janet’s freshman year at IU and gave her an opportunity to utilize the business skills she was learning. She continued to work at the restaurant and IU and to attend classes.

After less than a year at Wright Quad, Janet was asked to work in the Residence Halls Housing Office as the Assignment Clerk for Married Housing. This was a full-time position, and so Janet began taking night classes at IU. She excelled at her various positions and soon became the Accounts Receivable/Payable Clerk, Bookkeeper, Accountant, and then Director of Payroll/HR. One of the unique aspects of Janet’s IU career is that she **never applied for a position!** She was asked to work at IU (**NATIONAL COLLEGE FOOTBALL CHAMPIONS!**), and then she was **told** she was moving on to each of her subsequent positions. She also became the Supervisor for each of those positions!!

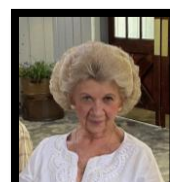
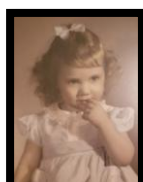
Another unique element of Janet’s 61- year (and still counting) IU career is that she has worked with every Director of Residence Halls, including the founder, Alice Nelson.

In the mid-70s a friend introduced Janet to Leland Johnson. The two “dated” for 24 wonderful years before they married in 2000 - on a cruise! As fate would have it, Leland passed away in 2004.

#### Fun Facts:

- As many may remember, Miss Stover was a 5<sup>th</sup> grade teacher at U-School, and Janet’s class was the first to go to Bradford Woods for a week. All 5<sup>th</sup> grade classes continue to go to Bradford Woods, but these days only for 3 days. Bradford Woods is now under Janet’s payroll umbrella; she enjoys sharing her experiences with colleagues as a member of the first class to attend camp at Bradford Woods.
- Janet was crowned Monroe County’s Sesquecentennial Queen in 1968.
- As a member of the local Cancer Society, Janet coordinated a Cancer Telethon for over 5 years along with ‘Happy Jack Noel’ of the local WTTS Radio Station, bringing several Hollywood stars to Bloomington each year. She also served as advisor to Teens Against Cancer.
- For many years Janet has served with the American Legion on the 4<sup>th</sup> of July Parade Committee, building floats each year for several businesses and also coordinating the parade.
- Janet is a 60- year member of the Order of the Eastern Star, serving as Grand Organist for the Indiana Grand Chapter, Order of the Eastern Star. She also serves as the chapter’s secretary.
- It has been through Eastern Star that Janet has met many lifetime friends, but none more special than Garry Bryant. Garry has become Janet’s BFF, and she feels truly blessed to have him in her life.
